# Accountants' new ethics standard acting for public interest

In July, A Plus interviews the chair of the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants, features China's growing electric vehicles market, looks at artificial intelligence in auditing, and more

(HONG KONG, 25 July 2016) – IESBA's new ground-breaking standard, *Responding to Non-Compliance with Laws and Regulations*, represents the first time the Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants has allowed accountants to bypass confidentiality. "This is a standard that needs the auditor or other accountant to respond to non-compliance with laws and regulations up to the point of disclosing it to a relevant authority in the appropriate circumstances," IESBA Chair Stavros Thomadakis tells A Plus.
